Christian grandparents have a tremendous potential to influence the hearts of their grandchildren, a potential second only to the parents. Sadly, grandparents are overlooked, ignored, and mislabeled as being "old." The Church has not recognized what Scripture says about the role of grandparents or provided resources to equip them. What is the Biblical Role of a Grandparent?

Summary:

Every member of the family is given a God-ordained role which is not interchangeable with other family members. God gives husbands the role of sacrificial service as the head, wives are to willingly follow their husbands' leadership as a helpmate, children are told to honor authority, and grandparents are to leave a spiritual heritage to future generations. Unfortunately, American culture is ambiguous about the role of grandparents.

The new social contract, described by Arthur Kornhaber, demands autonomy between the generations, leaves grandparents feeling disconnected, and encourages grandparents not to meddle in the lives of their adult children and grandchildren. The Bible instructs grandparents to leave a rich, godly heritage of faith to the fourth generation. God expects grandparents to tell their grandchildren about the work of the Lord and teach them his commands, so they will set their hope in him and not stray from his path.

- · The role of grandparents is ambiguous in American culture.

Summary:

A moral chasm threatens the hearts and minds of children. Therefore, it is imperative that grandparents tell grandchildren the whole truth about Jesus. Grandparents should teach grandchildren who Jesus is according to Scripture: a baby born in Bethlehem, a compassionate and loving friend, a suffering servant, The Lion of Judah, a righteous Judge, a jealous God, and an all-consuming fire. Grandparents make a difference when they incorporate at-home moments, on-the-go opportunities, wake-up rituals, and bedtime blessings to pass a spiritual legacy to their grandchildren. Loving Grandkids in Scary Times

Summary:

With words like Columbine and Sandy Hook generating terror, it's no wonder safety is the number-one issue for parents and grandparents. However, grandparents should want more for their grandchildren than physical safety. Grandparents optimize their days by growing in their own faith and trusting their grandchildren to God, as well as making sure their grandchildren are equipped with spiritual tools and know how to use them. Most importantly, grandparents should make sure their grandchildren understand God will never leave them nor forsake them.

- · Grandparents are uniquely positioned to point their grandchildren to Christ.
- · Grandparents must provide their grandchildren with spiritual tools and model how to use them.
- Grandparents must teach their grandchildren that God redeems their messes and will never leave them nor forsake them.

Never Too Late: Encouraging Faith in Your Adult Children

Summary:

Statistics reveal that a high number of young adults are disconnected from their faith, church, and family. Two-thirds of Christian parents who have empty nests experience guilt from having at least one prodigal child. There is encouraging news, however. Parents are still in the position to influence the faith of their adult children by following four parenting principles found in Scripture: (1) offer their heart to God, (2) turn their heart toward their children, (3) draw their children's heart toward them, and (4) point their children's heart to Christ. Parents begin by confessing and repenting of their parenting mistakes. They ask God to turn their heart toward their adult children in a spirit of compassion as well as draw their children's hearts toward them with warmth, honesty, and trust. Last, they ask God to give them the ability to share the Gospel message unashamedly.

- Parents' ultimate goal for their children is that they love God with their heart, trust Christ with their present and future, and arrive safely home.
- Parents are the shortest distance between the hearts of their adult children and Christ.

- Two-thirds of Christian parents experience guilt from having at least one child who has strayed from the faith.
- Parents must repent of their parenting mistakes and focus their prayers on the condition of their children's hearts.
- A powerful way for parents to build heart connections with their adult children is to ask forgiveness for their failures and to communicate fears about sharing their faith.

Grandparenting Through a Child's Divorce

Summary:

Parents have to face the reality of their child's divorce. They begin by giving themselves permission to grieve the death of a marriage, broken dreams, and loss of relationships. They need to be aware that their grandchildren may suffer torn loyalties. Their grandchildren will manifest the impact of the suffering differently, depending on their ages. God has placed grandparents in the family for "such a time as this" (Esther 4:14), to provide a safe, empathetic environment, rich in rituals and traditions, where grandchildren are free to express their pain. Grandparents help grandchildren survive divorce, so the pattern of divorce is not repeated through the generations.

- Grandparents grieve the death of a marriage and the loss of relationships when their adult child divorces.
- Grandparents are in the position to offer their grandchildren a safe environment, removed from the divorce battle zone.
- · Divorce may cause grandchildren to suffer torn loyalties between their parents.

- · Rituals are the emotional glue that holds the relationship with grandchildren together.
- · Divorce is cyclical.

The Art of Single Grandparenting

Summary:

Single grandparents have the difficult challenge of being alone. They simultaneously juggle multiple tasks such as babysitting, cooking, and entertaining, without the help of a grandparent companion. Grandmothers, whose husbands have abdicated their role as grandfathers, face a similar challenge. Widowed grandparents face the unique struggle of unexpected grief, which accompanies life's milestones such as the birth of a grandchild. Scripture reminds us that regardless of our circumstances, Christ came to bind the broken-hearted and to set the captive free. The church can assist by investing in the lives of all grandparents, building a community which provides fellowship, support, and sense of purpose.

- Three types of single grandparents exist: divorcees, widows/widowers, and women whose husbands are absentee grandfathers.
- · Single grandparents have the difficult challenge of being alone.

Passing on a Heritage of Faith with Enthusiasm and Joy

Summary:

Grandparents must get their grandchildren's attention in order to pass on a faith legacy. The key to getting grandchildren's attention is discovering who they are and what makes them tick. Are they creative or logical? Do they like to tinker or to read? Grandparents gain their grandchildren's attention, so they remember God's Word, understand it, live it, and experience changed lives. Grandchildren are more receptive to God's Word when grandparents invest in their lives and openly praise God for their identities as his handiwork. Opportunities for passing a legacy of faith to grandchildren include reading and discussing books, participating in service projects, creating prayer journals, carrying out science projects, and watching for God's blessings. If grandchildren don't develop their own walk with God, they will eventually forget him.

- Grandparents need to gain their grandchildren's attention, so they remember God's Word, understand it, live it, and experience changed lives.
- Grandparents need to invest in their grandchildren's lives and let them know they are the handiwork of God.

How to Pray and Read the Bible with Your Grandchildren

Summary:

Family is God's primary vehicle for reaching the hearts of children and grandchildren for Christ. Reformation churches radically committed to global evangelism recognized faith begins in the home. A shift from "home-centered, church-supported" to "church-centered, home-supported" evangelism and disciple-ship occurred in the 20th Century. Today, only five percent of church-going families have a regular time for daily prayer and Bible reading. The challenge is to start somewhere. The strongest family worship curriculum available is reading Scripture with a believing heart. The worship toolbox also contains activities, songs, discussions, prayer, and catechism. Satan will target the efforts of parents and grandparents, because the two most important relationships—the vertical relationship with God and the horizontal relationship with family—intersect with family worship.

- · Family is God's primary vehicle for evangelizing and discipling children and grandchildren.
- Five percent (1 in 20) of church going families have a regular time for daily family worship.

- · Family worship is the intersection between right relationships with God and family.
- · Family worship is a key target of the enemy.
- · Family worship includes activity, singing, Bible reading, discussion, prayer, and catechism.
- The strongest curriculum available is reading the Bible with a believing heart.

Unleashing the Power of Spoken Blessing

Summary:

A grandparent's words have the potential to bless or curse. The spoken blessing serves as a conduit through which grandparents affirm their grandchildren's worth as children of God. While prayers are spoken to God on behalf of grandchildren, blessings are spoken to grandchildren on behalf of God. There are two types of blessings: a general (recurring) blessing, such as the Levitical or Aaronic blessing (Numbers 6:24-26) and a personal (specific) blessing which occurs during life's milestones. The Levitical blessing beautifully communicates God's protection, pleasure, and peace. Spoken blessing consists of three critical elements: communicating high value, picturing a special future, and declaring our active commitment. A blessing is accompanied by a form of meaningful touch, such as a hand placed on the shoulder. Speaking blessings into the lives of grandchildren is critical to their spiritual health and well-being.

- · Words have the potential to bless or curse.
- · God is the source of blessing with parents and grandparents as his conduits.

- Prayers are addressed to God on behalf of others; blessings are addressed to others on behalf of God.
- The purpose of the blessing is to boost a child's self-worth (not self-esteem).
- Three elements of the spoken blessing are communicating high value, picturing a special future, and making an active commitment.
- · Two types of blessings include general (recurring) blessings and personal (specific) blessings.
- · A father's blessing is critical.
